Event Summary

Co-presented by OCAD University and research network & commercialization engine GRAND NCE, Euphoria & Dystopia gathers prevalent media researchers, industry leaders and participants of the Banff New Media Institute to reflect on the digital concerns of the 1990s and the early 21st century, and weigh these preoccupations against contemporary industrial, social and cultural trends.

Background

The Banff New Media Institute (1995-2010) in the awe-inspiring Rocky Mountains was a dynamic international centre that addressed dramatically changing times—the heady rise of the digital age, its tumultuous descent, and its reformulation. The BNMI hosted leading artists, designers, computer scientists and engineers, mathematicians, physicists, biologists, chemists, humanists, social scientists, and medical researchers. Its cutting edge summits (think tanks) foretold that future. These occurred at The Banff Centre, side by side with international artists' residencies, co-productions, transdisciplinary research, new media exhibitions and the incubation of commercial products and companies. The BNMI predicted and shaped trends in digital media.

This legacy as a both a catalyst for digital media research & development and an interdisciplinary site for its critical discussion is documented in Euphoria & Dystopia: The Banff New Media Institute Dialogues, edited by Dr. Sara Diamond & Dr. Sarah Cook. Drawn from thousands of hours of audio material and organized by discursive themes, Euphoria & Dystopia acts as a compendium for some of the most important thinking about art, design technology and the new media industries to have taken place in the last few decades at the international level.

This two-day event of the same name, comprised of a book launch, symposium & graduate student workshop, builds on the spirit of the publication by creating a forum (or perhaps a summit) for critical discourses on the future of digital media.

Dr. Sara Diamond

President & Vice-Chancellor, OCAD University Founder, Banff New Media Institute

Dr. Diamond is the current president of OCAD University, and co-editor of Euphoria & Dstyopia: The Banff New Media Institute Dialogues (w/ Sarah E. Cook). She has an Honours BA in Communications & History from Simon Fraser University, a Masters in Digital Media Theory from University of the Arts, London, England and a PhD in Computing, Information Technology & Engineering, from University of East London, with a focus on data visualization. Prior to joining OCAD, Diamond was founder of the Banff New Media Institute and Director of Research for the Banff Centre. Diamond has taught at Emily Carr Institute of Art + Design, Capilano College, California Institute for the Arts & remains an Adjunct Professor at UCLA. In 2012 she was made a member of the Order of Ontario.

Dr. Sarah Cook

Reader & Director of MA in Curating Module University of Sunderland, UK

Dr. Cook is a curator and writer based in Newcastle upon Tyne, UK & co-author (w/ Beryl Graham) of Rethinking Curating: Art After New Media (MIT Press, 2010) & co-editor (w/ Sara Diamond) of Euphoria & Dystopia: The Banff New Media Institute Dialogues. She also co-founded and co-edits CRUMB, the online resource for curators of new media art. She sits on the advisory board of the Journal of Curatorial Studies and co-chaired Rewire, the Fourth International Conference on the histories of media art, science and technology with FACT in Liverpool (2011). After completing her PhD in 2004, Sarah worked as adjunct curator of new media at BALTIC Centre for Contemporary Art funded by the AHRC. Sarah has curated & co-curated international exhibitions including Database Imaginary (2004), The Art Formerly Known As New Media (2005), Broadcast Yourself (2008), Untethered (2008) & Mirror Neurons (2012).

Susan Kennard

Manager of Heritage Programs, Parks Canada, Banff Field Unit Former Director & Executive Producer, Banff New Media Institute

In her role at Parks Canada, Susan provides leadership for the development and delivery of programs, partnerships and services associated with National Historic Sites, cultural resources and protected heritage areas. The contiguous seven Canadian Rocky Mountain Parks are designated as a UNESCO World Heritage Site encompassing 22,990 square kilometres. This local link to the cultural and natural heritage of the planet Earth is a source of great stimulation. Prior to working with Parks Canada, Susan was the director and executive producer of the Banff New Media Institute at The Banff Centre, leading the training, production, research, and development activity of the institute and the engagement of artists and researchers with new media aesthetics and digital culture.

Dr. Kellogg Booth

Scientific Director, GRAND NCE Professor, Computer Science, University of British Columbia (UBC)

Kellogg S. Booth is a Professor of Computer Science and the former Director of the Media and Graphics Interdisciplinary Centre at the University of British Columbia. Prior to UBC, he was a faculty member in the Department of Computer Science at the University of Waterloo (1977-1990), and before that a staff member at Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory (1968-1976). Research interests include human-computer interaction, visualization, computer graphics, user interface design, and analysis of algorithms. He is involved in a number of interdisciplinary research projects at UBC and elsewhere. He currently serves as the Scientific Director for GRAND, the Graphics, Animation and New Media, a Canada-wide network of centres of excellence in digital media.

She has just been awarded a NSERC STEACIE Memorial Fellowship in recognition of her outstanding research. Her research on information visualization, large interactive displays, and new media draws on her dual background in Computer Science (BSc. and Ph.D. Simon Fraser University) and Visual Arts (Sheridan College, School of Design and Emily Carr, College of Art).

Dr. Celia Pearce

Associate Professor in the School of Literature, Media & Communication, Georgia Tech

Celia Pearce is a game designer, author, researcher, teacher, curator and artist, specializing in multiplayer gaming and virtual worlds, independent, art, and alternative game genres, as well as games and gender. She began designing interactive attractions and exhibitions in 1983, and has held academic appointments since 1998. She currently teachs the School of Literature, Communication and Culture at Georgia Tech, where she also directs the Experimental Game Lab & the Emergent Game Group. She is the author & co-author of numerous papers and book chapters, as well as The Interactive Book (Macmillan 1997) and Communities of Play: Emergent Cultures in Multiplayer Games and Virtual Worlds (MIT 2009).

He is internationally known for his work in human-computer interaction, neural networks, intelligent agents, new interfaces for musical expression and interactive arts with over 100 scholarly publications and exhibitions.

Dr. Lyn Bartram

Assistant Professor, School of Interactive Arts & Technology, Simon Fraser University (SFU)

In addition to teaching at SFU, Dr. Bartram is a cofounder and the Director of the CoLab, a multidisplay research facility to investigate how people work together in both co-located and remote contexts. Her research interests include collaboration interfaces, perceptual issues in information visualization, methodologies for interface evaluation, & human interaction in complex systems. In particular she is interested in how the rich visual modality of motion and animation can be used in information visualization and affective interfaces.

Following his B.Math.degree from the University of Waterloo & M.Sc. and Ph.D. degrees from U of T, he was an NSERC Postdoctoral Fellow and Maitre Assistant at the University of Geneva, Switzerland. He currently sits on the Board of Directors of Tucows Inc. (Toronto), and the Advisory Board of the Intel Science and Technology Center for Visual Computing (Santa Clara).

Philip Beesley is a professor and a practitioner of architecture and digital media art. He was educated in visual art at Queen's University, in technology at Humber College, and in architecture at the University of Toronto. He also holds the position of Examiner at University College London. His Toronto-based practice PBAI is an interdisciplinary design firm that combines public buildings with exhibition design, stage and lighting projects. Beesley's funding includes core CFI, SSHRC, NSERC and Canada Council for the Arts grants.

He is the former Curator of New Media at the Walker Art Center in Minneapolis, Minnesota, where he founded the New Media Initiatives department in 1996, the online art Gallery 9 and digital art study collection. He founded one of the earliest, museum-based, independent new media programs at the Smithsonian American Art Museum in 1992.

Dr. Langill is a writer, artist, and independent curator. Her interdisciplinary practice began with a degree in biology, which she followed with studies in sculpture/installation at the Ontario College of Art. In the early 1990s, as visual arts programmer at Galerie SAW Vidéo in Ottawa, Langill curated a series of exhibitions revolving around artworks that incorporated new technologies. These exhibitions specifically engaged questions of navigating the digital/analogue shift. After completing an M.F.A. at York University, she pursued scholarly research in new media art history. These studies led to a Ph.D. in Canadian Studies at Trent University (Peterborough, Ontario), as well as a research residency at the Daniel Langlois Foundation for Art, Science and Technology (Montreal, Quebec) in 2006.

Martha Ladly is a Professor of Design and Associate Dean, Graduate Studies, at OCAD University She is a Registered Graphic Designer (RGD), and specializes in media and technology in art and design. She is also a senior researcher with the Mobile Experience Lab and a Network Investigator with GRAND NCE. Martha held the Chair of the OCADU Research Ethics Board (2008-2011), was Graduate Program Director of the Interdisciplinary Master's Program in Art, Media, and Design (2009-2011), and recently led the development of the Graduate Program in Digital Futures.

Jutta is the Director of the Inclusive Design Research Centre (IDRC), conducting proactive research & development in the inclusive design of emerging information and communication technology and practices. She has played a leading role in developing accessibility legislation, standards and specifications internationally (including WAI ATAG, IMS AccessForAll, ISO 24751, and AODA Information and Communication).

Cheryl L'Hirondelle

Visual Artist, Curator & Musician

Cheryl L'Hirondelle (aka Waynohtêw, Cheryl Koprek) is a nomadic mixed-blood multi and interdisciplinary artist, singer/songwriter & curator. Her creative practice investigates the junction of a cree worldview (nêhiyawin) in contemporary time and space. In 2004, L'Hirondelle was one of the first Aboriginal artists to present her new media work at DAK'ART Lab, part of the 6th Edition of the Dakar Biennale for Contemporary African Art, Dakar, Senegal. In both 2005 and 2006, L'Hirondelle was the recipient of the imagineNATIVE New Media Award, and in 2009 she was curator of Codetalkers of the Digital Divide and new media advisor for imagineNATIVE Film + Media Festival's 10th Anniversary.

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
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
